


Annual Report 1983 - 1984

CHAIRMAN'S MESSAGE





DIRECTOR'S REPORT

The basic CAMEC transitions in funding levels, staff reductions, and consequent reduction in program this year were up-front. The Grand Central Station atmosphere of rapid change in health care and in health personnel education is having an impact on all programs, and CAHEC Professional schools have lost is no exception. substantial amounts of public subsidy and therefore have been busy revamping curriculum and programs; changes in leadership and fiscal systems have influenced changes in priorities for institutions, services and programs at UMAB and elsewhere; changes in levels of employment and in third-party coverage are once again influencing the location patterns of new professionals and the participation of area practitioners in continuing education programs.

Many of the needs for which CAHEC was established years ago continue. The metropolitan environments of professionals schools have not changed, but the reduction in the amount of primary care being offered by teaching hospitals and the increased attention being given to

tertiary care has changed. The need for responsive learning environments in community settings is therefore even greater - perhaps especially so for medical students. The quality of CAMEC preceptors' work this year and in past years has brought the CAMEC student training program to a point of high demand for 1984-1985 when a record number of medical students will be coming to Western Maryland.

Students continue to cite the value of interdisciplinary communication and contact with students from other disciplines and with professionals of various practices which is made possible in the CAMEC program. With the retrenchment of many training programs and the survival-type preoccupations created by severe financial changes, emphasis on interdisciplinary cooperation often receives lower priority than in the past decade.

The Cumberland AHEC has continued to offer other services as well this year. The learning resource services - with the assistance of a library improvement

grant from the National Library of Medicine - have been restored and expanded to a very effective level under the direction of Mary Jo Maloney. Continuing education services - made possible by a one-year grant from the federal RHEC office - has given an unexpected boost to continuing education services with Steve Holowenzak's help.

Many persons on the Board of Directors, the IHEC, and in the caucuses have contributed to help 1983-1984 be a good year for CAHEC, but there are four groups who seem to warrant special mention in this brief report. First of all the CAHEC preceptors — all volunteers — once again have done an outstanding job in teaching students on placement from various programs and institutions. Secondly, the Nursing Caucus met on an average of once each month and succeeded in fulfilling each of their objectives for the year and were particularly effective in helping to solidify support for the continuation of the UMAB Nursing Outreach Program for Western Maryland. Thirdly, the legislative delegation from Washington,

Garrett and Allegany counties has done an excellent job in giving support and impetus to the work which was required to support the continuation of CAHEC in both this year's and next year's legislative sessions. And fourthly, Dr. John Dennis and Dr. James Hudson of LMAB have been especially helpful to CAHEC by providing guidance and leadership toward helping CAHEC to prepare for its future services. For the work of all of these persons, the organization and the people that CAHEC serves can be most appreciative.

To conclude this report without commenting on the work of Kathy Coakley, the CAHEC office manager, would be inappropriate. Kathy has helped the organization cope with several changes this year, learned how to use a computer, and contributed very effectively to help sustain the momentum of the organization's services. We are appreciative for the responsive and responsible ways in which she has done her work and for the enthusiastic way which she has helped the organization provide its services.

PROGRAMS AND SERVICES

The IHEC Lee B. Ross, Chair

The role of the Interdisciplinary Health Education Council in a year of significant reduction in program funds has been pivotal in providing direction for the Center's changing programs. In addition to planning various options for future directions and service, the Council has provided guidance for this year's educational and library services.

Education Services

Interdisciplinary Continuing Education

The two primary interdisciplinary continuing educational events planned for 1983-1984 have been a symposium on alcohol and drug abuse prevention conducted in Hagerstown for over 100 health and human service professionals. This conference was planned in coordination with the Washington County Health Department and featured a number of prominent speakers. The second event was planned in cooperation with the Maryland Lung Association and Memorial and Sacred Heart Hospitals and addressed needs for information on asthmatic bronchitis. Dr. Steven Shonfeld of Johns Hopkins and Sinai Hospital was the principal resource person, and Dr. James Raver and Dr. Richard Schmitt were the two coordinators for separate presentations at the two hospitals.

Computer Education Services

The 1983-84 Continuing Education Program was made possible to CAHEC by a "Health Educational Initiatives with Microcomputers" grant from the Department

of Health Resources and Services Administration through the Maryland Statewide Education and Training System. CAHEC's continuing education planning, development, and implementation activities have emphasized the interaction between presenters, participants and machines in a series of six professional devlopment seminars on the use of desktop computers in health care services. Through lectures, discussions, demonstrations, and "hands-on" experiences, each seminar program provided pharmacists, social workers, psychologists, physicians, and dentists with state-of-the-art clinical and practice management information on microcomputer hardware and software applications. To date 102 health personnel have attended.

Another aspect of the computer education services has included computer training to students and residents involved with CAHEC's Placement Program. In addition, the Health Risk Appraisal computer program was offered to the general public at the Allegany County Health Fair. The services will continue with a seminar for nurses and a series of workshops scheduled for the summer of 1984.

Community Education

In spite of reduction in services in health career education and speakers bureau services, CAHEC continued to provide leadership in the coordination of the Allegany County Health Fair. The Fair involved the participation of 31 health organizations and 142 volunteers as well as the financial contributions of 10 businesses and organizations. It was held at the Country Club Mall and several thousand people attended.

Learning Resource Services

1983-1984 marked a year of expanded library services despite reduction in staff support. After a summer hiatus, CAHEC was able to restore Learning Resource Services with the help of the University of Maryland at Baltimore School of Medicine, Health Sciences Library, and the Southeastern Atlantic Regional Medical Library Services.

With funds received from a National Library of Medicine Resource Improvement Grant, CAHEC more than doubled its book and journal collection. To seek additional funds for staff support, CAHEC offered contractual library services to local organizations. Potomac Valley hospital utilized the service and hired the Information Specialist as a Library Consultant. She prepared a Library Development Plan, a Policies and Procedures Manual, a list of recommended purchases and trained a member of the PVH staff in basic library skills. Garrett Memorial Hospital medical staff also requested a presentation and preliminary analysis of their collection.

Another departure from past years, the Information Specialist assisted local hospital staff to take MEDLEARN, a computer-programmed course in MEDLINE training; provided basic MEDLINE instruction to students in the Placement Program; and spoke at a meeting of Maryland's public library administrators regarding CAHEC's library services.

As another function of Learning Resource Services, two newsletters have been published and numerous news releases written for the Allegany County Health Fair and other CAHEC-sponsored events held this past year. Additional library statistics follow: patrons assisted . . 337; MEDLINE searches performed . . 131; reference questions received . . 152; interlibrary loans requested . . 223; materials added and catalogued . . 133; materials circulated . . 74.

PLACEMENT PROGRAM

With a 35% reduction in funding from the previous year, CAHEC was requested to plan a reduced size in its placement program for 1983-1984. Several University of Maryland programs also were undergoing change, and as a result of both circumstances, the number of participants dropped from 55 in 1982-1983 to 33 in 1984-1985. It is already evident, however, that CAHEC placement participation will increase in 1984-1985. As far as first practice location of CAHEC participants after completing professional training is concerned, as of July 1, 1983, 40% serve small cities and rural areas and 26% of all participants have returned to Western Maryland.
